Patron of the Basil Sellers Art Prize

Basil Sellers AM, (born 1935, India) A businessman and philanthropist who has made his career breathing life into ailing companies. Basil is a celebrated art collector and patron. His collection spans over 37 years and contains Post War Australian art and many of the European modernists, with a particular interest in the Fauves (1906/7) and the Cubists.

Basil in conjunction with the Ian Potter Museum at the Melbourne University is the benefactor of the \$100,000 Basil Sellers Sporting Art Prize. Basil Sellers has been instrumental in the realisation of the Sydney Cricket Ground Trust Basil Sellers Sports Sculptures Project.

Basil Sellers clearly demonstrates a life-long commitment to the perpetual growth of Australia's perception, understanding and engagement with the arts.

PREVIOUS WINNERS

The Basil Sellers acquisitive art prize was established in 2004 as a biannual event for artists in the Eurobodalla Shire. 2010 was the inaugural year for the inclusion of artists from the Bega Valley, Cooma Monaro, Bombala and Snowy River Shires.


The \$15,000 acquisitive prize has been made possible by the collector of art, patron and extremely generous philanthropist, Basil Sellers.



Dr. Denise Ferris

Martin is co-director of Beaver Galleries, Canberra's largest privately owned commercial gallery. The exhibition programme, which is devoted to the work of Australian artists, covers contemporary practice in a wide range of disciplines including paintings, sculpture, printmaking, ceramics, glass and jewellery. Martin was a Board member of the Melbourne Art Fair for many years and is a member and past Board member of the Australian Commercial Galleries Association and Craft ACT.



Deborah Ely

Deborah Ely is the Chief Executive Officer of Bundanon Trust, the national arts organisation located on the South Coast of NSW and gifted to the Australian people by the artist Arthur Boyd. Prior to taking up her current position she was the Visual Arts and Craft Manager at Arts NSW, Director of the Australian Centre for Photography in Sydney, founding Director of the Centre for Contemporary Photography in Melbourne, Co-ordinator of the first Experimenta festival of new media in Australia and Visual Arts Director of Watershed Media Centre in the UK. She was trained in Britain as a painter and as an art historian.


The Last Estate
