




HELEN MUSA

BASIL SELLERS AM

Patron of the Basil Sellers Art Prize

Basil Sellers AM, (born 1935, India) is a businessman and philanthropist who has made his career breathing life into ailing companies. Basil is a celebrated art collector and patron. His collection spans over 37 years and contains Post War Australian art and many of the European modernists, with a particular interest in the Fauves (1906/7) and the Cubists.

Basil in conjunction with the Ian Potter Museum at the Melbourne University is the benefactor of the \$100,000 Basil Sellers Sporting Art Prize. He has also been instrumental in the realisation of the Sydney Cricket Ground Trust Basil Sellers Sports Sculptures Project.

Basil Sellers clearly demonstrates a life-long commitment to the perpetual growth of Australia's perception, understanding and engagement with the arts.
